Policies and Procedures

Course Description

This is an introductory survey course in the academic discipline of psychology using basic principles and concepts utilized to understand behavior and the mind. The major areas of study include learning, perception, motivation, emotions, personality, abnormal behavior, psychotherapy, social influences, biological functioning of the nervous system, and testing measurements.

Course Goals

Research methods; child, adolescent, and adult psychology; psychological testing; personality, and abnormal psychology; psychotherapy; social psychology; applied psychology; history of psychology; and physiological processes, principles of learning and memory, human perception, and cognition.

Course Objectives

This course will provide you with a general introduction to the field of psychology. At the end of this semester, a student in this course should be able to

- Recognize the major perspectives within the field of psychology and identify findings relevant to those perspectives.
- Use theories and research findings to describe and predict behavior and mental processes both in the



laboratory and real-life settings.

- Explain the role of behavioral research techniques in creating a scientific study of psychology.
- Summarize and interpret articles based on psychological research.
- Describe ethical principles that guide psychologists in research and therapy.

Course Requirements

- Required weekly textbook reading (chapter assignments can be found in the course outline)
- Required that you find time each week to work on your presentation. Final presentations will not be due until the end of the semester but the presentation will take research and preparation before delivering the final presentation.
- Required Exam at the end of every week within the semester.

Participation and Grading

Grades will consist of exams, thought papers, and a presentation. The final grade in this class will be based on the cumulative points you earn this semester.

Exams: (100 points each) The exams will be 50 multiple-choice questions (2 points each). The exams will cover the material covered in class in addition to the reading assignments for each section and the assigned chapters.

My exams are based on understanding and applying concepts that we cover in the class. I do not ask questions based on memorization. As a study technique, I suggest that you create examples of the concepts as you go through your reading. This will help you be in the practice of being able to identify and apply the various concepts in this class.

Thought papers: (50 points each) The thought paper will consist of a critical analysis of a topic covered in class and its application to the real-world. Thought papers should be 1- 2 pages in length (double spaced). The purpose of a thought paper is to provide you a brief opportunity to demonstrate your understanding of the assigned topic.

Presentation: (100 points): Each student will be required to give a 10 minute presentation on a topic selected from a sign up list at the beginning of the semester. Each student, in essence, will teach the material related to this specific topic. During this student-led class discussion/presentation you must provide a description of the problem, a description of the concept being applied, and an application of the material. Presentations can be recorded and submitted in a similar way to how I provide the lecture videos for our class.

Study Assignments: (optional study tools) I have provided a set of optional activities. These will not count towards your grade in the class but I highly encourage them to help make sure you are grasping the major concepts in the class and to study for the exams. Each optional assignment will be focused on helping you either identify and apply the concepts from the lectures and reading or will be used as a review activity in exam preparation.
