## **Course Goals**

Students will develop skills in critical analysis and interpretation through comparison and an awareness of history, culture, and iconography in art and architecture from the 16th through the 20th centuries.

## Mode of Instruction

The instructional mode of delivery for this class is an asynchronous meeting of the instructor and students using video/digital technology. We will have two virtual class via Zoom during the term. These sessions are an opportunity for you to ask questions, review course materials, and collaborate with your instructor and classmates—just as you would in a traditional classroom.

Because we will not be meeting together in a physical classroom, you will be responsible for participating and demonstrating your understanding of course material through discussion forums, and online assignments.

I will respond to student emails concerning course content within 24 to 48 hours, Monday through Friday. I will contact you via your e-mail account and/or via Moodle. It is your responsibility to monitor your email accounts consistently.

- Portraiture Essay: Write a comparison essay between two portraits discussed during the term.
- **Reflection Essay:** Address how your learning has evolved throughout the course.

• **Discussion Posts:** Your grade is dependent upon the quality of your preparation, overall effort, and frequent participation on the discussion board.

## Week One

#### Objectives

- Reading and Writing Art History
- Review significant artists and their patrons working in Italy during the 14th and 15th centuries.

#### Assignments

- Read textbook chapters 12 and 13, among other assigned material.
- Submit visual analysis essay, quiz 1, and post on discussion board.

#### Week Two

#### Objectives

• Review artworks from the Burgundian Netherlands during the 16th centuries. Review artwork from the Dutch Republic (modern-day Holland), focusing on the effects of the Protestant Reformation during the 17<sup>th</sup> century.

#### Assignments

- Read textbook chapters 13 and 14, among other assigned material.
- Submit Quiz 2 and post on the discussion board.

#### Week Three

#### Objectives

- Review the trading relationships among the Dutch, Portuguese, and Benin kingdom during the 16th century.
- Review Aztec and Incan art and architecture during the 14th and 15th centuries. Review the integration of Catholicism within Indigenous cosmologies.

#### Assignments

- Read textbook chapter 15, among other assigned material.
- Submit Quiz 3 and post on the discussion board.

#### Week 4

#### Objectives

- Review artworks from Europe and the United States, circa 1750 1850.
- Review artworks from Europe and the United States, circa 1850 1900.



• Examine Japan's Ukiyo-e style and its influence on French artists.

#### Assignments

- Read textbook chapter 17, among other assigned material.
- Post on the discussion board.
- Submit portraiture essay
