


# Spotlight on...

## **TECHNOLOGY FOR SENIORS**

As someone who's seen technology evolve from rotary phones to smartphones, I was both curious and a little intimidated when I signed up for our WALL class titled "Technology for Seniors." What I found was a truly enlightening experience that made the world of AI not only understandable, but exciting—and even fun.

The tutorial was thoughtfully designed with seniors in mind. It moved at a gentle pace, using clear, jargon-free language and real -life examples to explain complex ideas. The highlight was the section on ChatGPT, an Al developed by OpenAl. Along with other Al websites such as, Copilot, Gemini, Leonardo Al, Joe Finkelstein showed us how these programs can write stories, help plan a trip, explain medical terms, write music, create Al artwork or even using an app to find parking in downtown Macon!

What made the session especially valuable was how it connected AI to everyday life. It wasn't about turning us into tech experts overnight—it was about empowering us to engage with these tools in a way that feels natural and helpful. The instructor was patient, approachable, and respectful of everyone's comfort level with technology. No question was too basic, and there was a real sense of community among participants.

We came away not only more confident in using AI tools like ChatGPT, but genuinely fascinated by their potential. This tutorial turned curiosity into capability—and we came away with a better understanding of AI!

# GETTING TO KNOW OUR WALL 2025 SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS






